Once upon a time, in a galaxy far away.....




Well, our story may not be quite as exciting as you know what; but for we here in Louisiana, the birth of the MG Car Club has been an exciting event indeed!

The Club was started in April of 1977 by Eldridge E. Reynolds and his wife Diana. Eldridge was an MG "Fanatic". He would chase MG's to find out more about the car and it's owner. He had an MGA - fully restored but no one in the club

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ever saw it. He kept it stored at his mother's house in North Louisiana. Diana did drive a white 1965 MGB. At the time the club was formed Eldridge and Diana were living in the Vineyards apts. and the club held its first few meetings there. Eldridge and Diana moved to North Louisiana in Oct. or Nov. of 1977 and soon after the club began meeting at Pepperoni's Pizza Parlor. (After Eldridge left Jack Kennedy took his place as "MG chaser"). In the summer of 1977 Eldridge approached John about joining the club and Jack Kennedy came to our door in the pouring rain to see if we would be interested in joining. Without this kind of enthusiasm I wonder if we would still be in existence today.

The first year of the club was spent trying to "chase" new members and get organized. Not many events were held, except for meetings. Eldridge did set up a rallye which was held in Nov. after he moved. The Rallye ended at Fort Pike on the lake. Of the six cars entered only one was an MG and the Rallye was won by a motorcycle. This rallye has since been repeated with better MG participation. The newsletter during the first year was sporadic with no official newsletter editor.

The first year's Christmas Party was held at "Lucky Pierre's" in Fat City. It took the place of the meeting and the election of officers was held at that time. Of the 13 original members, 5 are still active. The five are: Snubbs Bienvenu, Toni Creel, Jack Kennedy, Roger Talley and John Winter.

The club's second year was an active one with a lot of members and enthusiasm. Buzz Reese was elected president. In the Spring we held our first picnic on the lakefront and it was very well attended. This was the first time many of the wives became familiar with the club. (It was my first meeting with a group who we would come to share some of our fondest and funniest memories with Kathie). The club held a rallye in May and a summer BBQ at Nick Tusa's house in Metairie.

Buzz Reese moved in June and the Presidency of the club was taken over by Toni Creel. A late summer Rallye was put on by John Pence and his wife, Jeannine. It was a fun rallye with questions that will bring back memories to the "old timers". Remember "Who protects Flame 'N Burger?"?

In the early fall the club toured to Oak Alley and on to dinner at El Palacio Mexican Restaurant in Baton Rouge. Most of these events were full of MGs (that was before we all had children or before the children got to big to fit in the MG).

In October we had "The Great Pumpkin Rallye". This was a night costume rallye and was great fun. (We hope to have another one this year.) We all showed up at Lakeside parking lot in Halloween costumes. We had Raggedy Ann & Andy, Dracula and his bride, hoppers from the fifties, giant pumpkins, a Cowboy and Cowgirl and various others. The rallye was a hound 'n hare and ended with a party at Vince and Jean Olsen's house.

In November of 1978 the founder of the club, Eldridge Reynolds, died in an automobile wreck in North Louisiana. We decided at that time to begin a Memorial Rallye in his honor, a tradition we still hold every November.

1978 was the first year we held the Night at the Races event. This event has also become a traditional event although it has lost some of it's appeal the last few years. We seem to go more for the meal afterwards than the racing. The Christmas party was held at Joy and Carlisle's home and was also the start of a tradition in which we hold the party in a home and everyone brings a dish.

THE THIRD YEAR

Pence (Meridith Gail), is the daughter of John and Jeannine. He insisted his child's initials would be M.G. and thank goodness there are some nice names that start with those letters. John was a real devoted MG fan.

Jack Kennedy put on his first rallye in August and did a great job. It was a late afternoon rallye and ended at Louigi's Pizza Parlor on Elysian Fields. It was the start of counting birdbaths if I remember correctly.

In the fall we held a street concourse on a Sunday afternoon in the Clearview Shopping Center. It was a beautiful day and a lot of cars showed up plus a lot of people stopped by just to look and talk. In October, 3 adventurous couples took off for Road Atlanta in C. Taravella's van. From the stories they came back with I'm sure that trip will live forever in their minds. Of the three couples, the Taravellas, Bienvenus and Kennedys, only Peggy and Snubbs have made the trip again.

We officially started the traditional Eldridge Reynolds Memorial Rallye in November of 1979 (I guess January's was just a practice for the real thing). The loving cup was awarded at this rallye and is passed around from year to year to the winner and the winners put on the rallye the following year. The E.R.M. Rallye is usually a time speed-distance rallye.

The Christmas party was once again held at Joy and Carlisle's home with the thought that 1979 would be the last year there because they were moving to L.A. (lower Alabama, as Carlisle liked to say).

THE FOURTH YEAR

The summer rallye in July was perhaps the most interesting rallye we've done. It was Lin Lee's "Midsummer's Nights Bar Hopping Rallye". Each team was given a list of eleven bars located throughout the city and their addresses. The object was to go to all of them and the team with the least mileage was declared the winner. Members had to enter each bar and answer a question. An added twist was that each team was dealt a card at certain spots along the route and the team with the best Poker hand won a special prize. (Jack & Audrey Kennedy won with a pair of aces!) What made this event even stranger was that it was run on an evening when the city experienced power outages throughout large portions Of the area. But, everyone had a great time! Later on in October, a very successful concourse was held in City Park. I believe this may have been the last one ever sponsored by this club.

As usual, the fourth annual E.E. Reynolds Memorial Rallye was held in

the beginning of November. Snubbs and Peggy Bienvenu put it on, with a route that covered a lot of Metairie and River Ridge, and it was won by Rodger and Fran Talley. AND since the first trip to Paul B. Johnson State Park was such a success, another one was held at the end of the month. This is the one that made Bob Lee's "Quiche" and "Creamy Crab Dip" famous. REMEMBER?

FINAL NOTES - The Christmas Party was held at the home of Snubbs and Peggy Bienvenu again (and it still is!). It was great!

The point system was not reinstated. Toni Creel and C. Taravella won the prizes for 1981. Meg and Andre Jurisich had a little girl this year. As you can see, it was perhaps our busiest year ever! Do you all think that we can top it?
